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Ashtabula SWCD Celebrates 60 Years

On January 28, 1949 the Ashtabula Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) was formally organized. Organized by interested and concerned land users from all parts of the county, its beginning was a humble, yet marked event in the development and enhancement of the county's soil and water resources, their maintenance and their use.

Enabling legislation enacted in 1941, House Bill 646, was the means by which the county's land users, concerned with their eroding cropland and poorly drained soils, were able to officially and legally organize an agency to help them resolve their land use problems.

The seventy-fourth District to be organized in Ohio, the Ashtabula County SWCD was originally called the Soil Conservation District. As the district's program enlarged and diversified over the years, the name was changed to reflect this. In 1968 the district's official name was changed to include "Water". The importance of maintaining water quality in our lakes, rivers and streams was very well known, and as sedimentation is an integral component in erosion control, it was only natural that the then called Soil Conservation District focus its attention on downstream water quality as well as upland watershed erosion control.

In 1948 E. A. Spafford, a dairy farmer in Trumbull Township, while listening to his radio heard of a new organization of farmers called the Soil Conservation District in the State of Iowa and the free assistance given to farmers. Later in the day he drove to Jefferson to speak with Mr. Ross Milner, Agricultural Agent for the Ashtabula County Cooperative Extension Service. Questions turned into further investigation of the steps necessary to organize a District in Ashtabula County.

In June of 1949 the first formal meeting of the Ashtabula Soil Conservation District was held. Present were: John C. Clymer, Cherry Valley Twp.; C. R. Longbrake, Pierpont Twp., C. F. Cram, Monroe Twp; E. D. Humphrey, Williamsfield Twp., and Albert Spieth of Richmond Twp. Election of officers took place at this meeting. Discussion of funding was held and suggestion was made to contact the Farm Bureau, Cooperative Holstein Free-sian Club, and the Grange and ask for donations to help things good cause along. A total of \$27.00 was contributed by those contacted by the first Board of supervisors.

By September 9, 1949 the Board of supervisors were ready to sign a formal memorandum of understanding with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS). By January, 1950 a total of 173 people had signed up as cooperators. The very first one was the man who brought the entire concept to bear: M. E.A. Spafford.

Literally millions of dollars have been invested in the conservation of the soil and waster of Ashtabula County by private landowners, the federal government, the state government, and the county government. The number of actively involved cooperators of the District has grown from 173 the first year to 2,406 in 2009.

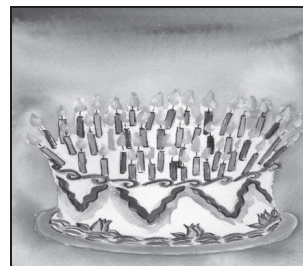

**TRIPLOID GRASS CARP
2009 FALL ORDER FORM**

Triploid Grass Carp (White Amur) can be successfully used to control excessive amounts of pond vegetation as an alternative to chemicals, water shade and physical harvesting. Stocking rates recommended vary – many people recommend a flat rate of 10 fish per acre of 10-12” size.

Successfully managed ponds have 30-40% of pond area vegetated for fish habitat. A POND DEVOID OF VEGETATION IS UNDESIRABLE; KEEP 30-40% of POND EDGE VEGETATED. This provides suitable area for fish to spawn and also prevents shoreline erosion.

Factors involved in proper stocking include:

- 1) Size of pond surface area.
- 2) Percentage of pond shallower than 8”
- 3) Percentage of pond vegetated in July-August
- 4) Dominant plant species (favored species include:
Naiad, Leafy Pondweed and Large Leaf Pondweed.
Less favored are: Water lily, Spatterdock, Milfoil, Cattails, Algae)

Amur Delivery: TUESDAY, OCTOBER 06, 2009 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 am. Bring one 5-gallon bucket for every two Amurs ordered. Line each container with an UNSCENTED, HEAVY DUTY garbage bag, and fill containers ¾ full with water (no more, no less!) Container must have a lid.

Pick up place: ASHTABULA COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS, west side parking lot. Orders must be picked up at this time as we have no place to keep them and we do not deliver.

MATERIALS TAKEN:

PAINT: Paint & Paint products - 5 gallons container or smaller. **Excessive quantities of paint containers may be charged.** Aerosols acceptable. Includes adhesives/roof tar/driveway sealers.

HOUSEHOLD CLEANERS: Acid and caustic products.

BATTERIES: All household batteries. Lead acid automotive batteries, limit of 4 lead acid batteries/vehicle.

AUTOMOTIVE FLUIDS: Motor oil, up to 5 gallon containers - prefer 1 gallon containers, Antifreeze, Brake fluid, Grease, Gasoline.

PESTICIDES: Liquids, Solids and Aerosols.

MERCURY: Thermometers, Thermostats, and Elemental mercury.

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS: Explosives, ammunition, gas cylinders, radioactive wastes, large quantities of unknown materials.
